Piping Aboard A New Captain for "A Morning in Maine"

We are thrilled to announce that Captain Tyler Waterson will be captaining *A Morning in Maine*, the 55' Pete Culler designed ketch that was generously donated to the museum this fall by her former owners, Capt. Bob and Cathy Pratt.

Growing up, Capt Waterson lived aboard his family's sailboat every summer, sailing the Maine coast for a month every year. He received his six-pack captain's license while teaching sailing at the Seacoast Sailing School in New Castle, NH at the age of 17.

After getting a degree in Biology and Environmental Studies from Tufts University, he studied Marine Biology at San Francisco State University. He worked as a naturalist on board whale-watching trips to the Farallon Islands and later ran eco-tours on the 78-foot gaff-rigged *Schooner Freda B*, eventually earning his Master's license and sailing on the challenging waters of San Francisco Bay.

In his travels, Tyler has sailed from Los Angeles to Seattle and from Florida to Maine, covering most of both coasts. He also worked as a commercial fisherman in Alaska and Hawai'i, guided kayak tours on the remote Na Pali Coast of Kaua'i and even worked below the water's surface as a snorkel guide.

Before returning home to New England in 2020 to be closer to family, Tyler and his fiance Tiffany ran the bed and breakfast in the historic East Brother Light Station on San Francisco Bay.

Tyler and Tiffany are proud to be Rockland residents and to have the opportunity to work with the Sail, Power and Steam Museum running *A Morning in Maine Sailing Charters*.

And we are proud to be "piping aboard" this wonderful new Captain who we are confident will continue Capt Pratt's wonderful 34 year legacy of entertaining and educating guests aboard *A Morning in Maine*.


The stories are all recorded and can be found on our museum YouTube channel. The response has been overwhelming. We have had more than 8,000 viewers perusing our programs and almost 2,000 people watched them live. The Schooner Bowdoin story alone has had 2,630 fascinated watchers. That little schooner has had a spectacular and exciting past, spending years in the Arctic with Admiral Donald MacMillan, "wintering in" with the Inuit, and having igloos constructed on her deck.

Our Winter Reading



If you've wandered through the Sail, Power, and Steam Museum's "Shipwreck Room," you've seen the fabulous model of the paddlewheel steamship, *The Portland*, as well as

the photograph of her today, lying on the bottom of the Atlantic.

The Portland was a luxurious vessel, owned by the Portland Steamship Company, ferrying passengers from Boston to Portland on a regular schedule.

In 1898, weather forecasting was in its infancy, but when all signs pointed to a brewing storm off the New England Coast and the Captain of The Portland made the fateful decision to ignore the warnings, it spelled disaster for the 200 people aboard.

The Portland Gale, as it became known, was a "perfect storm" of two systems colliding in the Atlantic, resulting in a blizzard with 100mph winds and 60' waves, sending more than 200 ships to the bottom, killing 400 people along the coast, and eventually decimating Portland's African American population, many of whom were crew onboard The Portland.

The storm, the boat, her crew, and her passengers form the basis for a well researched and interesting read, "The Wreck of the Portland," by J. North Conway. The book chronicles the history of the vessel and many of those aboard. It tells of the history of weather forecasting and the damage that the storm caused up and down the eastern seaboard.
