And we wrapped up the concert season with a special concert by Maine music legend, Gordon Bok, filling the Boathouse with over 150 guests who came from all over the country just to see him. Our Sailing Programs Grew

You asked us for more time on the water, and boy—did we have fun doing that!

Our third year of **SKFF** (Sail Kids For Free), our free youth sailing program saw nearly 150 kids out in Rockland Harbor in our Opti fleet. We even ran a couple of extra sessions at the re-



quest of parents—one group wanted to spend time focusing on capsizing and righting their boats, and another group of 5-7 year olds wanted to give sailing a try after seeing older brothers and sisters enjoying the program.



We're proud to say that SKFF was a resounding success, once again! And special thanks to all of you who chipped in an extra donation or two to make sure these kids had the chance to sail FOR FREE!

Also expanding significantly this year were **adult sailing lessons**, **classroom navigation lessons**, and **charters aboard classic vessels like** *Meriwether* **a Herreshoff 12-1/2 or** *Persistence*, **a Friendship Sloop**.



Here we go again: Almost every day, something unusual comes through the door

The latest is this cunning little steam engine—still dusty from the creator's workbench — a homemade boiler and 3-tone whistle.



A steam engine is one of the most efficient of the power sources. A little engine that has the look of a boy's toy would run a full-sized automobile back in 1900. Now there are steam engines 1/ 20th the size of a human hair and steam engines that power the largest ships. They can run on virtually any fuel from wood to hydrogen and power everything from automobiles to airplanes. What makes it cumbersome is the doggone boiler. Such engines will give instant power and lots of it. Steam engines deliver a wide range of RPM and do it very quietly with seeming little effort. Through a small pipe it will deliver race winning speed to a Stanley steam car's drive wheel. The downside is the enormous boiler, heat source and weight of the water it must lug around, not to speak of the time it consumes while on the fire waiting for the pot to boil. But when steam was discovered, it was tried in every contrivance. Not just cars but bicycles, scooters, airplanes, dirigibles, outboards, even helicopters and just about every machine requiring power.
